

Nurse Aides – Long-term Care

Professional Qualifications: Nursing Aides have the ability to read and write well enough to follow written directions and to do charting. It is important to read well enough to understand the dangers that come with working with the chemicals, equipment and supplies in the nursing department. Verbal communication skills are important to carry on conversations with residents, co-workers and visitors in an understandable manner. Nursing Aides will have passed the nursing assistance course or be able and willing to do so within 120 days of employment. Nursing Aides are continually learning and growing by participating in educational sessions, inservice training and demonstrations.

Medication Aides – Long-term Care

Professional Qualifications: Medication Aides will have completed the State-approved nurse assistant training and Medication Administration Training Program approved by the Division of Aging. Verbal communication skills are important to carry on conversations with residents, co-workers and visitors in an understandable manner. Written communication skills is necessary for documentation. Medication Aides are willing to participate in educational sessions, inservice training, and demonstrations. Some training may require out-of-town travel.

LPN – Long-term Care

Professional Qualifications: Nurses must be licensed in their practicing state as an L.P.N. and have a current C.P.R. Certification. L.P.N. have the ability to read and write well enough to follow written directions, do charting and resident assessments. Verbal communication skills are important to carry on conversations with residents, co-workers and visitors in an understandable manner. Nurses are continually learning and growing by participating in educational sessions, inservice training and demonstrations. Nurses will provide direction and monitoring of medications for recipients who are receiving medications by medication aides.

RN – Long-term Care

Professional Qualifications: Nurses must be licensed in their practicing state as an R.N. and have a current C.P.R. Certification. R.N.'s have the ability to read and write well enough to follow written directions, do charting and resident assessments. Verbal communication skills are important to carry on conversations with residents, co-workers and visitors in an understandable manner. Nurses are continually learning and growing by participating in educational sessions, inservice training and demonstrations. Nurses will provide direction and monitoring of medications for recipients who are receiving medications by medication aides.
